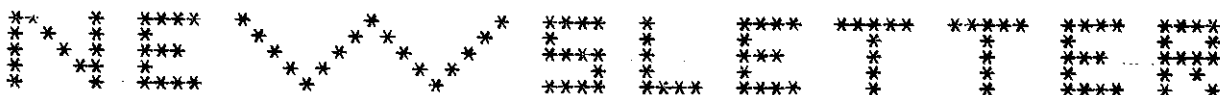

SECRETARY'S NOTES

TUESDAY CLUB SESSIONS

For two years now we have been able to hire Riverside Baths for a total of 3 hours, but the additional hour granted to us then has only been available on a six monthly renewal basis.

Following many alterations now beginning to take effect in the Baths service due to personnel and policy changes, the Council have decided to give 'our' hour back to the public starting from 3rd July, we have been told just for the high season and school holiday period, although this is still subject to confirmation on their part.

Obviously this will seriously affect our class allocations particularly on the four Tuesdays prior to the school break. Commencing from 3rd July the Beginners Group will switch to Fridays and the children will be incorporated in the two Groups held on that evening. We hope to give everyone else a swim in the reduced time available, full details will be announced in advance so watch the Notice Board.

We hope to get our hour back in September and every effort will be made to do so. Meanwhile please accept our apologies for any inconvenience caused but it will be appreciated that these matters are outside our direct control.

To change the subject especially for our young girl swimmers, remember that there is an A.S.A. law which relates to the style of costume you are allowed to wear when swimming in competition. It says that shoulder straps must be attached to the front and the back of the costume. You should not wear the halter neck type of costume that we see at the seaside, it can get you disqualified in a gala or the whole team disqualified if you are in a team event.

SOUTH DOWNS RAMBLE, SATURDAY 28th APRIL, 1984

The final Saturday of the school Easter Holiday saw 17 Club Members and friends experience a very enjoyable day out on the South Downs in West Sussex. The combination of beautiful weather and scenery made the lengthy train journey worthwhile as we were soon to discover.

After alighting at Amberley station the first leg of our Ramble led us to the nearby village which boasts a ruined castle and many attractive thatched cottages. We then ascended the Downs and from our elevated position on Amberley Mount we were able to look back over the village and beyond to the North Downs which were silhouetted against the distant skyline. This particular area of the South Downs had seen industrial activity, the deep scars of the chalk quarries acting as reminders, as does the Museum that has recently opened there.

Retracing our steps over the Arun, we began another steep climb onto the Downs at Bury Hill where once again the views were ample reward for energy expended. After following the South Downs Way for several miles, we finally made a stop for lunch at a point some 600 feet above sea level overlooking the surrounding countryside.

With a radiant sun, a cool breeze and only the song of the skylark to break the silence, those everyday problems just seemed to melt away. Indeed, I think everyone would have been quite content to have remained there for the rest of the afternoon. Suitably refreshed, we resumed the Ramble. We were soon joined by a glider soaring high overhead upon the thermals produced by the Downs.

Due to pressure of time, it was with some reluctance that we decided to shorten our trek along the South Downs Way and instead, turn south, to descend into Houghton Forest.

We were not to regret this decision as the dense undergrowth provided a total contrast to the open heathland scenery of the Downs and, in addition, enclosed a habitat that was rich in wildlife. In the sunlit glades we saw many butterflies and various birds, including the uncommon long-tailed Tit. For many though the highlight of the Ramble was still to come, for there in a clearing, we had the rare reward of seeing an Adder. For a minute or so all our fears about snakes were dispelled as we watched it slither away into the undergrowth.

A mile or so further on, we were abruptly brought back to everyday life due to our route being bisected by a busy main road. This was soon left behind and forgotten as we crossed to enter Arundel Park, the pathway leading us along a steep ridge affording fine views over the Arun Valley. Again we encountered nature at close quarters in the shape of pheasants and rabbits and then in one field, dozens of sheep and their lambs bleating plaintively.

Shortly we were to catch a glimpse of our goal, Arundel Castle, and beyond, the English Channel was visible too. We finally descended from the Downs at a

point beside the wildfowl reserve of Swanbourne Lake and then continued on our way beneath the imposing bastions of the Castle itself. Unfortunately we did not have time to linger, so a hurried procession was made through the town, just in time to catch a London-bound train home.

So this brought to a close an Outing to remember and certainly one of the most rewarding Rambles we have yet undertaken. Needless to say my intentions will be to arrange another South Downs Ramble next year, so keep an eye open for this and any other Outing details on the Club notice board and avoid missing out on future fun!

OUTING TO PORTSMOUTH, SATURDAY 22nd JUNE, 1984

With so much to see in the City of Portsmouth an exciting day was in prospect.

After a surprisingly smooth train journey, 14 Club Members and parents alighted at the harbour station within sight of our first objective, H.M.S. Victory. Nelson's flagship was not looking at her best as she was undergoing further restoration, (so would we if we were over 200 years old) but the guided tour that followed certainly made up for this disappointment. In addition to giving a concise account of her history, our guide, a naval rating gave us a very vivid account of life on board this fine fighting ship. Seeing the cannons, the punishment rail and the actual place where Nelson was brought after he was mortally wounded at the Battle of Trafalgar, gave everyone an uncanny feeling. It was as if he had sensed the miserable conditions that existed at that time, that my son, Matthew at first was a little upset, even though he had previously enjoyed visits to the S.S. 'Great Britain' and the 'Cutty Sark'. Indeed Sammy Hayes found some of the facts hard to swallow as his smiles prompted our guide to pass his Naval cap to Sammy and to request him to continue with the lecture (all in good spirit I must add). Thus it was with some mixed feelings that we finally disembarked from H.M.S. Victory after a very absorbing tour.

A mere stone's throw away lay the remains of an even older ship, namely the 'Mary Rose'. The Naval rating had jokingly referred to her as H.M.S. Driftwood and although our first impressions were a little disappointing our guide related how reconstruction will progress over the next few years, and, by using a little imagination one began to understand why archeologists have got so excited, (unfortunately the Museum which will house the many interesting relics found in the Tudor warship, had yet to be opened).

Lunch followed in the parade square by H.M.S. Victory and within a short distance of warships from the U.S. Navy that had berthed there the previous day. As a bonus on leaving the Naval base, we were treated to the sight of the Royal Yacht 'Brittania' coming into dock bringing the Queen Mother to Portsmouth for the D-Day 40th Anniversary celebrations.

There then followed a walk through the new and old areas of the City until we reached the sea wall providing us with fine views across the Solent to the Isle of Wight. With the sun blazing down the waters looked especially inviting and several of the boys had to be restrained from going swimming.

With a promise that we would return to the inevitable amusement arcades, we carried on to the headland surmounted by Southsea Castle. This edifice provided an interesting link with the 'Mary Rose' as from the battlements, King Henry VIII saw the English fleet set sail and actually witnessed the sinking of his flagship. Another interesting bonus here was provided by an exhibition of lavish costumes worn by the actors in the award-winning B.B.C. - T.V. series 'The Six Wives of Henry VIII'

By now, it was time to start our return journey back to the harbour station. This was not before some of the boys had used up their pocket money on amusements whilst I took several others around the dozens of historic military vehicles that were displayed on Southsea Common prior to their departure to France for the D-Day celebrations.

Our hurried passage back was made just in time to catch the return train home with a consequent arrival back at Abbey Wood station on schedule again!

Beyond question, everyone had experienced a thoroughly enjoyable day.

Postscript: With the 'Mary Rose' and D-Day Museums just recently opened and the Dolphin Submarine Museum still to be seen too (to name but 3) there is still ample scope for another exciting outing to Portsmouth next year..... so don't miss that one either.
